While we were talking to library users out in the garden, Kate Cartmell and Barbara Weston were in the much warmer and drier Junior Library, helping younger library visitors make their own books. Ruth Vidler and librarian Claire Grogan entertained with their storytime sessions.

We think that the garden design is elegantly simple and sympathetic to the Grade-II-listed library building. Gabbie has taken into consideration the requests of library users, and her design includes accessible pathways, seating for reading and quiet activities, a special storytelling area, and planting that will appeal to the senses and be attractive to wildlife.

Gabbie is now putting the final touches to the design and specifications. We expect to receive the plans in a handover ceremony to coincide with our second Annual Party in the Garden on Saturday 12 September. We'll then be able to start fundraising in earnest so that we can make the Reading Garden a reality in 2010.

...a busy spring

ST Annes Library staff paid a visit to Oak Tree Children's Centre. They read stories and introduced the children and their families to some fun songs and rhymes.

WORKING with the YMCA, the library hosted a group of children for a fun-filled afternoon of talk, games, a story and healthy snacks to finish.

TWO events were held to celebrate World Book Day. Twenty-one children came to the Teddy Bears Picnic storytime for the under-fives, listening to stories, taking part in a craft activity and enjoying a drink and biscuit. And then after school we held a Drop-In craft session; 31 children attended altogether, including six brand new members.

THE Teen Reading Group, or TRG as they like to be known, is going strong with 11 regular members. They have rearranged the teen section to their own specifications, taken part in quizzes, and written some fantastic book reviews.

TEN children from St Thomas' School joined us for an event with local artist Jane Blackburn. They made carnival headgear and Mothers Day cards.

A LARGE group of 22 children visited the library to celebrate the 40th birthday of *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* by Eric Carle. The children listened to the story, made a Hungry Caterpillar bookmark and enjoyed a drink and snack.

Toddler sessions

WE hold weekly Bounce-and-Rhyme and Toddler Rhyme sessions every Monday. They are both extremely well attended. There is also a thriving monthly Chatterbooks group for children aged seven to nine to talk about books and take part in quizzes, crafts and activities.

ST George's Hall in the United Reform Church, St Annes was the venue for this year's local history display. The theme was 'Sport, Leisure and Entertainment in the Fylde'. The display attracted many local and community history groups from across the area, with holidaymakers and daytrippers also showing an interest.
